Re: **Amended FY 2025 – 2026 RRRASOC Budget**

Action Requested

Approve the attached amended FY 2025 – 2026 RRRASOC budget.

Overview and Recommendation

At its January 29, 2026 Regular Meeting, the RRRASOC Board of Directors approved entering into an agreement for software and service with BS&A Cloud to utilize its Financial Management Suite.

The payment schedule stipulated that \$12,555 was to be invoiced upon execution of the agreement, with \$3,115 to be invoiced upon the subscription start date, and \$6,125 to be invoiced upon completion of training.

Those costs associated with the agreement and service were included in the FY 2025 – 2026 amended budget (\$12,555) and the FY 2026 – 2027 RRRASOC budget (\$9,240) approved by the RRRASOC Board of Directors on April 23, 2026.

However, we were able to accelerate the training schedule and implement the system during the current fiscal year. Consequently, costs anticipated for FY 2026 – 2027 were incurred during the current fiscal year. The attached amended budget adjusts the Computer Software line item to include those costs in the current year. Inasmuch as those costs approach the material amount threshold recommended by Plante Moran and adopted as policy by RRRASOC, Board approval of the amendment is recommended.

Mr. Wuerth moved to approve the Consent Agenda. Ms. Mikus supported, and the motion passed unanimously by the Board.

6. Presentation – Sam Caramago, VP of Municipal Relations, Priority Waste

Mr. Caramagno introduced Vince Hoyumpa, Interim CEO of Priority Waste.

Mr. Hoyumpa updated the Board on the status of Priority Waste both structurally and financially. Mr. Hoyumpa informed the Board that under his leadership operational staff will remain the same, internal controls are being streamlined, outstanding APs are being consolidated, trucks are being purchased instead of leased, sponsorships of the Detroit Tigers and Detroit Red Wings have been cancelled and customer training on current technology is available.

Ms. Tessin informed the Board of the MMWA's status with Priority Waste.

Mr. Hoyumpa reassured the Board that moving forward, Priority Waste is committed to customer service and invited the Board to direct questions or concerns to either his or Mr. Caramagno's attention.

B. Republic Services Update

Mr. Csapo informed the Board that he is waiting for a written extension of the service agreement from Republic Services for the running of the MRF. Mr. Csapo also informed the Board that the plant is now running a first shift only, EGLE permits are in the Authority's name and building and equipment updates and repairs are taking place.

C. General Manager's Evaluation

Mr. Csapo withdrew his request for his annual performance evaluation take place in an Executive Session.

Action Requested

Accept the May 22, 2026 proposal from Republic Services and authorize the RRRASOC General Manager to enter into a one-year extension of the *Agreement for the Operation of the RRRASOC MRF* with Republic Services in accordance with the proposal.

Overview

The current *Agreement for the Operation of the RRRASOC MRF*, expires on December 31, 2026, with provisions for possible extensions. On June 26, 2025, the Board of Directors approved the current one-year extension.

Over that past few months, Jon Gagnon, General Manager of the Detroit Business Unit for Republic Services, and I have been discussing Republic Service's expressed interest in the terms and conditions for a potential three or five-year Renewal Term. However, significant market uncertainty (locally and domestically) has continued to interfere with Jon getting corporate approval for an extension longer than one year.

Consequently, Republic Services has proposed to extend the existing agreement for an additional year, subject to the items included in the attached May 22 letter. Those items are consistent with the previous extension and the recently adopted RRRASOC budget for FY 2026 - 2027.

In addition to being consistent with the previously approved extension and the recently approved budget, the proposal is competitive with both solicited and unsolicited agreement proposals received by RRRASOC.

Over the past six months, Republic Services has made significant operational and facilities improvements, including securing the MRF General Permit as now required under State law. Those improvements also include the repairs and investments on the attached document.

Recommendation

Accept the May 22, 2026 proposal from Republic Services and authorize the RRRASOC General Manager to enter into a one-year extension of the *Agreement for the Operation of the RRRASOC MRF* with Republic Services in accordance with the proposal.

Re: Amended and Restated Agreement for Operation of the RRRASOC MRF.

Dear Mr. Csapo:

In connection with the Amended and Restated Agreement for Operation of the Resource Recovery and Recycling Authority of Southwest Oakland County ("RRRASOC") MRF dated February 20, 2015 (the "Agreement"), and the Amendment to the Agreement for the Operation of the RRRASOC MRF dated December 1, 2021, Resource Recovery Systems, LLC ("Contractor") and the RRRASOC hereby agree to amend the Agreement as follows:

1. **Article 2: Term of Agreement** provides: "The initial term of this Agreement shall be for fifteen (15) years from the Commencement Date ("the Initial Term"). Thereafter the term of the Agreement shall be renewable for one (1) period of two (2) years at the sole discretion of Contractor, and three (3) successive periods of five (5) years each (each a "Renewal Term") subject to the mutual written agreement of RRRASOC and the Contractor. In the event Contractor does not exercise its initial two-year extension, the parties may nonetheless mutually agree to transition into the initial five-year extension period. All renewals shall be subject to six (6) months prior notice and subject to termination pursuant to the other provisions of this Agreement. The Initial Term and the Renewal Terms hereof shall be referred to herein collectively as "the Term."
2. The current Term is set to expire on December 31, 2026, and the parties hereby agree to extend that term for one (1) year to December 31, 2027.

3. From January 1, 2027, through December 31, 2027, the tipping fee shall be \$110.00 per ton, and the rebate will be 80% to RRRASOC and 20% to Contractor based on ACR. This modifies and replaces the terms set forth in **Section 6.3** (Monthly Revenue Share) and **Section 6.4** (Trigger Point Annual Escalation) of the Agreement.

4. Article 3.17: Alternate Facilities shall be amended to update the acceptable alternate facilities to include:

GFL Baldwin Facility (Pontiac)

5. All other provisions in the Agreement remain the same.

COMMUNITY CONNECTIONS

FOOD WASTE: WHY YOU SHOULD BE CONCERNED

The waste coming from homes and businesses in our communities has implications beyond disposal. **Community Connections** is a series of publications dedicated to educating decision-makers and broadening their understanding of the implications of waste on quality of life, community health and safety, the local economy, and the environment.

As leaders of local and county governments the intent is to elevate and prioritize effective policy, infrastructure, and systems to support waste reduction and the circular economy.

In 2024, nearly 30% of the U.S. food supply went unsold or uneaten. A very small portion was donated to the hungry or used to make another food product. 25% became food waste and was left to rot on farm fields, or ended up in the landfill, incinerated, or washed down the drain. **Food waste makes up 19% by weight of what is disposed of in Michigan landfills. An estimated 1.5 to 2 million tons of food is wasted each year.**



Food waste is a global issue with local solutions and impacts.

Addressing food waste creates opportunities for local solutions that positively affect the community.



Hunger

Across Michigan, 1.5 million people are facing hunger - and one in five of those are children.

Food rescue and redirecting food to people will improve the quality of life and health of food-insecure households all over the state.



Air Quality

Food disposed in landfills converts to harmful greenhouse gases such as carbon dioxide and methane.

Reducing food waste in landfills reduces emissions, odors, and related respiratory health occurrences in surrounding neighborhoods.



Water Quality

Food waste disposed of down the drain can overburden water resource recovery facilities (WRRF) and **compromise water quality.**

Removing food waste from the WRRF helps maintain quality and regulatory compliance, keeps operational costs manageable preventing the need for rate increases.



Natural Resources

The water, land, energy, and fuel required to grow, harvest, transport, cool, cook or prepare food is **monumental**, whether it is eaten or ends up being disposed of.

Food waste prevention makes efficient use of natural resources and reduces greenhouse gas emissions to the benefit of the local and global community.



Local Economy

Economic opportunities arise when communities shift from landfill disposal to focus on keeping materials cycling through the economy, attracting local investment and entrepreneurs.

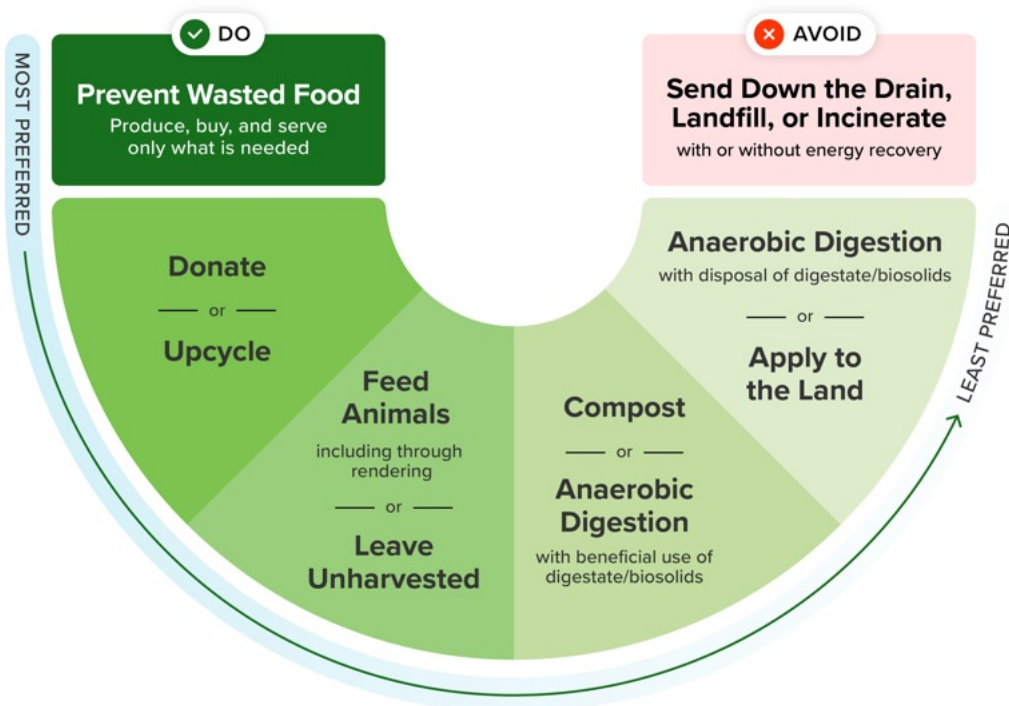
Jobs are created to support local food rescue and redistribution, composting, soil health, and public education.

REDUCE - REUSE - COMPOST

The **U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Wasted Food Scale** ranks strategies for preventing and managing wasted food based on their environmental and circular economic benefits. The scale is organized from the most preferred options at the top left to the least preferred at the top right. While pathways within the same tier are considered equally preferable, each tier represents a different level of value recovery and environmental impact.

The highest-priority strategies - preventing food waste, donating surplus food, and upcycling food - provide the greatest environmental and economic benefits. These approaches keep food at its highest-value use by ensuring it continues to serve its primary purpose: nourishing people. In contrast, the lowest-priority options - landfilling, incineration, and disposing of food through drains or sewers - have the greatest negative environmental impacts and offer little to no opportunity for resource recovery or circularity.
